SIR WILFRID LAURIER SECONDARY SCHOOL CANADIAN AND WORLD ISSUES (CGW4U)

CREDITS: ONE COURSE OUTLINE:

This course draws on geographic concepts, skills, methods, and technologies to analyse significant issues facing Canadians as citizens of an interdependent world. Students will examine the challenges of creating a sustainable and equitable future through the study of a range of topics, including economic interdependence, geopolitical conflict, disparities in the ability to meet basic human needs, and protection of the planet's life-support systems.

Strand: Geographic Foundations: Space and Systems

27 hours

Overall expectations

By the end of this course, students will:

- explain the complex nature of the earth's natural and human systems;
- analyse the causes and effects of economic disparities around the world;
- demonstrate an understanding of the cultural, economic, and political aspirations of selected groups and the effects of their actions on local, national, and global issues

Strand: Human-Environment Interactions

27 hours

Overall expectations

By the end of this course, students will:

- analyse selected global trends and evaluate their effects on people and environments;
- analyse geographic issues that arise from the impact of human activities on the environment;
- evaluate the protection and sustainability of the planet's life-support systems

Strand: Global Connections

28 hours

Overall expectations

By the end of this course, students will:

- demonstrate an understanding of the interdependence of countries in the global economy;
- analyse instances of international cooperation and conflict and identify factors that contribute to each;
- identify the contributions made by a variety of individuals, organizations, and institutions to sustainable development strategies for the developing world, and evaluate their economic, environmental, and social impacts

Strand: Understanding and Managing Change

28 hours

Overall expectations

By the end of this course, students will:

- analyse, forecast, and evaluate changes in the human use of the earth and its resources;
- evaluate the cultural, economic, and environmental impact of changing technology;
- evaluate the effectiveness of methods used by different organizations, governments, and industries to find short- and long-term solutions to geographic problems and issues.

The final grade for each course:

- 70% of the grade will be based on assessment and evaluation conducted throughout the course.
- 30% of the grade will be based on summative evaluations administered towards the end of the course.
