Sir Wilfrid Laurier Secondary School SOCIETY CHALLENGE AND CHANGE (HSB4U)

This course focuses on the use of social science theories, perspectives and methodologies to investigate and explain shifts in knowledge, attitudes, beliefs and behaviour and their impact on society. Students will critically analyse how and why cultural, social, and behavioural patterns change over time. They will explore thee ideas of social theorists and use those ideas to analyse causes of and responses to challenges such as technological change, deviance, and global inequalities.

COURSE EXPECTATIONS

Research and Inquiry Skills

- A1: Explore topics related to the analysis of social change, and formulate questions to guide their research
- A2: Create research plans, and locate and select information relevant to their chosen topics, using appropriate social science research and inquiry methods
- A3: Assess, record, analyze, and synthesize information gathered through research and inquiry
- A4: Communicate the results of their research and inquiry clearly and effectively, and reflect on and evaluate their research, inquiry and communication skills

Social Change

- B1: Demonstrate an understanding of the major theories, perspectives and methodologies related to social change
- B2: Demonstrate an understanding of thee causes and effects of social change
- B3: Demonstrate an understanding patterns and effects of technological change from a social science perspective

Social patterns and Trends

- C1: Demonstrate an understanding of the importance of demographics as a tool for studying social patterns and trends, both nationally and globally
- C2: Demonstrate an understanding of how forces influence and shape social patterns and trends
- C3: Demonstrate an understanding of social science theories about social deviance, and how various responses to deviance affect individuals and society

Global Social Challenges

- D1: Demonstrate an understanding of how various social structures and conditions support or limit global inequalities
- D2: Assess the impact of globalization on individuals and groups
- D3: Analyse the impact of unfair or unjust exploitation of people or resources, locally and globally

The final grade for each course:

- 70% of the grade will be based on assessment and evaluation conducted throughout the course.
- 30% of the grade will be based on a summative evaluation administered towards the end of the course. There will be a summative project worth 10% and an exam worth 20%.

Guidelines for Missed Evaluations and Academic Fraud:

- Upon missing a test or presentation, students will be required at the teacher's discretion, either to:
 - a) Complete the test or presentation immediately upon return to school; or
 - b) Make arrangements with the teacher for a make-up; or

<u>Note:</u> Certain forms of formal summative evaluations (exams, summative project presentations, etc.) are time sensitive. This means they must be completed at and within a specific time.  Teacher will document and archive the work in question. Students may be allowed to resubmit the assignment. The teacher and administrator will define the parameters for the completion of this task.
